STANDING COMMITTEE FOR CEREMONIAL REJUVENATED

Freemasonry, being a fraternal organization with a long history and a diverse membership, can exhibit variations in rituals across different lodges within the District. While there are core principles and symbols that remain consistent throughout Freemasonry, the specific rituals and ceremonies can vary based on factors such as geographical location, historical influences, and individual lodge traditions. As a result, individual lodges often develop their own traditions and customs over time and these can include variations in the way certain rituals are performed, unique symbols or regalia used, or specific protocols observed during meetings. some Lodges may have slight variations in ritual practices, wording, and ceremonial procedures.

Overall, while Freemasonry maintains certain core principles and symbols, the variations in rituals across different lodges add to the richness and diversity of the Masonic experience, allowing each lodge to express its unique identity within the broader framework of the fraternity.

The Sub-Committee for Ceremonials constituted within our District is responsible for planning a uniform approach to the various ceremonial rituals as well as other rites and observances that are central to Masonic tradition and also ensuring that all ceremonies are uniformly conducted with proper decorum and solemnity. Overall, the Ceremonial Committee plays a crucial role in upholding the traditions and values of Freemasonry, and ensuring that its ceremonies are conducted with dignity and reverence. After having discussed the finer points amongst themselves, the Committee under Bro. Farokh Santoke, convened a virtual meeting of all the Scottish Brethren throughout India on Sunday 4th February 2024, when the participants had a fair exchange of views on the ceremonial aspects of Scottish Freemasonry.

WHY THE DECLINE OF FREEMASONRY?

Freemasonry, which enjoyed abundant peace and prosperity later developed into apathy, pleasure became licentiousness, morality and responsibility declined, all of which created an atmosphere leading to inability of Lodges and Masons to withstand prosperity.

In the early years of Freemasonry, emphasis was particularly directed toward needy brothers or their widows and orphans. The community, in which they lived, came to regard Freemasons as generous and caring people, and their individual assistance was also extended to others outside the Craft. Masons were recognized as being "good" people, and it was a real honor to be known as a Mason. There was a general rule of thumb that, on the average, one out of every five applicants would be rejected. This was at a time when Masons would not sponsor a petitioner unless they were not only certain of his moral qualifications, but also that he had talents that would contribute to the Order, and that he would be a credit to Freemasonry.

We have, for many years, suffered a loss in membership. Many good and conscientious Masons have labored at great length to develop programs to reverse this trend. There have been many instances of waived rules, special dispensations, programs of education which amount to actual solicitation. As Freemasonry is purely a moral, philosophical science, how effective will such actions be? How long will members continue after initiation, and will they remain interested when they discover what Freemasonry promises but fails to produce?

It takes time to make a Mason. We freely admit that we can never learn all that can be found in our philosophical science, but we must continually strive for perfection. The problem is that the sands of time are running low in the hour glass. We are becoming too old, and too few.

It is often said that the public does not know for what Freemasonry stands, and that we must cultivate public awareness, or that we must be more active in the community affairs. In the affluence of our prosperity, we lost sight of our guidelines and began deviating from the Ancient Standards, and the Masonic image faded from public recognition. The basic cause of our condition is the fading of the Masonic image in the public eye. If that image had been kept bright and shining, we would be receiving sufficient applicants to replace our natural losses. Loss of membership is not entirely caused by death, but instead, by loss of interest and involvement, failure to pay dues, and lack of attendance. Part of this loss of interest is due to the fact that the member did not understand what he was joining, part is due to his feeling that the Lodge has lost interest in him, as it does very little to further his education, and part is undoubtedly due to his disappointment upon finding that the Lodge is not doing what it proclaims Masons must do.

Over the years, we ignore the generally accepted Masonic Law, and deviate from the Ancient Standards, all in the name of political correctness. The deviation from our standards has resulted in a high percentage of illiterate Masons, blissfully unaware of the true Masonic philosophy. Masonry's greatest success was evident when our public image was brightest. It was the popular thing to become a Mason. Unfortunately, Lodges began contesting for great numbers, and this led to diminished investigations and lowered standards. It also led to failing to promote the masonic education and understanding of new members, as well as ignoring the needs of our brothers and their families -- in other words, forgetting our obligations.

In too many cases, we parrot the ritual but do not absorb the lessons it contains. We do not study or understand Masonic Law, especially that portion concerning traditions, usages, practices and procedures which constitute the unwritten law.

We often hear that we must change Freemasonry, that we must simplify admission, we must abolish memorization, we must shorten the ceremonies, we must publicize our good works, and above all, we must, as Lodges, be vitally active in community affairs. Let us analyze these suggestions. In the first place, Freemasonry is a moral, philosophical science. You may disagree with its philosophy, and adopt some other, but that doesn't change the original philosophy upon which Masonry is based. The Masonic philosophy is not subject to change, you can only deviate from it. The suggestion to simplify admission means lowering the standards of applicants, which overlooks the fact that the Masonic image will not be improved by such procedures. Masons are a special class of people, carefully selected for quality, not quantity. We are told that memorization must be abolished because that is not used in school now, and many people cannot memorize. How have they learned to do so for hundreds of years?

Shortening our ceremonies would be unnecessary if those performing are able to give impressionable performances, sufficient to hold a candidate's interest. Rebuilding the Masonic image depends upon educating and activating the individual Mason. He must be taught the true Masonic philosophy and filled with its spirit, which motivates him to act. He must fully learn, believe in, and be faithful to, his Masonic obligations, and his schoolroom must be his Lodge. Each Lodge must assume its obligation to educate its members, point out their duties, and lead them as they go about their Masonic labors.

It is not the will of the Great Creator that the light of Freemasonry shall be completely extinguished. The developing degradation of the world, the common weakness of humanity, and our tendency to ignore our laws and abandon the Ancient Standards will continue until that light will only dimly flicker in the faithful breast of a very few intelligent and dedicated Freemasons, probably operating in deepest secrecy. Upon the promised return of Holy Rule, it may then be resurrected, a Phoenix, arising from the ashes of the past.

The decline of Freemasonry has been a topic of discussion and speculation in recent times. While Freemasonry's prominence and membership numbers have fluctuated over time, there are several factors that have been suggested to contribute to its decline. One of them is the Changing Social Dynamics meaning Freemasonry historically thrived in an era when fraternal organizations were more common. However, as society has evolved, the need for such organizations has diminished, leading to a decline in membership.

Freemasonry's secretive nature, including rituals and symbols, has led to suspicion and scepticism in some quarters and can be off-putting to potential members. Freemasonry has often been viewed as an exclusive and elitist organization, which can deter individuals who do not feel they fit the perceived mould. The demographic profile of many Freemason lodges skews older, and efforts to recruit younger members have not always been successful. Younger generations may not see the relevance or appeal of joining. Decline in Community Engagement on account of some lodges having to struggle to maintain this level of engagement, further erodes their relevance to broader society.

Other Internal aspects like leadership disputes, financial difficulties, and membership management issues have weakened the cohesion and effectiveness of individual lodges and contribute to overall decline.

Despite these challenges, Freemasonry continues to exist in many parts of the world, and some lodges have undertaken efforts to adapt to changing times by modernizing their practices, increasing community outreach, and revisiting membership criteria. However, the overall trend of declining membership is a significant concern for the future viability of our cherished Order.
